Welcome to the 2018 Newsletter.

Derbyshire Dales District Council (DDDC)

DDDC have recognised that the security of the external equipment store cupboard needs to be improved, given that we now have the "new" mower in it. The suggested work includes new semi-concealed hinges to the doors, and the addition of hinge bolts to the door frames. Hopefully this work will be carried out at the same time as other pavilion maintenance work.

We now also have under bench equipment storage in the changing room at the north end of the pavilion. This has to be accessed through the pavilion. To facilitate this DDDC will install a digital key safe in the external equipment store, and this will contain pavilion keys, a key for the under bench store padlock, and a key for the china cupboard. All Committee members will have a key to the external equipment store cupboard, and Club members should have a key if they are so minded. We charge a £5 returnable deposit for each key. Committee members only will be told the combination of the digital key safe.

Practice Tips – Coach's Corner


Shooting at another ball – fire balls at a target ball from fair distance – if you start missing reduce the distance until 100% strike success


Hoop approaches – fire balls to a target point in front of hoop where a hoop success on next shot is guaranteed


Hoop running – fire shots from different distances and angles until confident on success


Stop shot approaches – fire balls at target ball to move it to identified positions.

Angled promotions – Fire a ball at Ball 2 to direct ball 2 to hit ball three









And keep your feet about as wide as your shoulders.

Errors and Faults - A Simplified Guide

Error	Rule (4 th Edition)	Action		
Offside				
At the moment a hoop point is scored, any ball that is more than half-way to the next hoop is offside unless it reached its position in that stroke, following contact with an opponent's ball, or by being directed to a penalty spot	10	Opponent(s) can decide to leave the offside ball where it is or have it moved to a penalty spot		
Playing a wrong ball (after firs	t three turns	of the game)
